Charter schools are public schools that are allowed the freedom to innovate while being held accountable for

student achievement.

Public charter schools are available for families in parts of Oklahoma. These schools can be opened after they are authorized by school districts, colleges and universities, or the state.

Public magnet schools are permitted in all 50 states and focus on specific themes, such as math, science, technology, or the performing

Oklahoma has several magnet schools and programs that families can consider.

Online public schools are permanent, fully-online, and free educational options that teach students through digital classes.

Oklahoma offers several online schools, including Oklahoma Virtual Charter Academy, Oklahoma Connections Academy, Epic Charter School, Insight School of Oklahoma (grades 6-12), E-School Virtual Charter Academy, and Oklahoma Information and Technology School (grades 6-7).

Private schools are widely available, charae tuition, and may be faith-based or independent. Many private schools or nonprofit organizations offer scholarships.

Oklahoma students with special needs, students in certain underperforming schools, or students who meet certain income guidelines can qualify for state-run scholarships. Starting in January 2024, any private school student will be eligible for a tax credit up to \$7,500 for private school tuition

All parents in Oklahoma have the freedom to homeschool their children. Parents are currently not required to provide a notice of their intent to homeschool their children. However, please check updated laws and regulations before proceeding.

The state does not require homeschooling parents to teach specific subjects and does not require standardized testing for homeschoolers. Starting in January 2024, homeschoolers can apply for a \$1,000 tax credit for learning expenses.
